President Dick Lombard discussed the Lake Dam Report prepared by Chairperson Dan Robinson.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE: No Meeting in April

OLD BUSINESS

Water Committee – Recommendation for Meter Setters.

Water Committee Chair person Kirk Osborne recapped the in-house meter setter proposal history. He handed out a detailed cost estimate report. Water Committee Treasurer Dan Robinson also discussed the merits of an 1-house water meter setter project as opposed to an outside contractor doing the work. The board expressed reservations of in-house projects, and unanticipated cost over runs.

The board did <u>not act</u> on the Water Committee recommendation to proceed with the in-house effort to install water meter setters.

Chairperson Kirk Osborne told the board he anticipates a shortfall in the water long-range capital revenue. There are more demands on the water system, community growth, and the regulations from the State Water Department. A town meeting should be held to discuss a water fee increase prior to the October Semi Annual meeting. The water budget will be presented in August 98 to the Board of Trustees, then the total budget will be voted on by Lake Limerick members in October 98. A trustee noted the water fees do not need to be approved by the membership since it is a utility.

The Board appreciates the efforts on the meter setter project by the Water Committee and they will4esubmit a proposal in May.

2. Lake-Dam Committee – Continued by Dan Robinson.

Chairperson Dan Robinson talked about the geese problem. He noted a loud noise-making device is the only acceptable recourse and will purchase these items to be used around the lake.

An underwater weed harvester (Roto-Mite) will be demonstrated on Lake Limerick May 11.

NEW BUSINESS:

1. Jora Lee Contract – Same as last year, \$563.33/month + special events.

Motion made by Tr. Gary Ayers, seconded by Tr. Bill Buff and carried by the Board as follows:

The Board of Trustees approves the renewal of Jora Lee's cleaning contract, including the option to add cleaning of the kitchen floors.

2. Cascade Natural Gas -

Pam Ritter said the Gas Company is again trying to run natural gas lines down Ballantrae Drive. Cascade Natural Gas Company will be having an informational Town Meeting soon.

COMMENTS FROM MEMBERSHIP:

Treasurer Bill Buff noted Curt Burnett was involved in the 501 C7, Not For Profit status of Lake Limerick.

One of LLCC members attending the Wednesday Night Dinner had difficulty in negotiating the stairs. Tr. Gary Ayers noted it is important to update the ADA ramp.

To: Lake / Dam Committee

The following is my recommendation for Lake Management action for the 1998 Season.

In view of the plant growth surveys conducted the past year, the Brazilian Elodea is obviously regaining a foothold throughout Lake Limerick. As we have seen in past years, partial lake treatments are ineffective in controlling this weed. Accordingly, it is my opinion that another whole lake treatment with SONAR (or equivalent) will be required in about the year 2001. Toward that end, I recommend that we minimize Lake Management expenditures until then, bank the Lake Management budget against that treatment, and attempt to extend our present grant to that time period.

To further this goal this year, I propose the following 1998 actions.

- 1. Use a contact herbicide against the rushes in Leprechaun, the various weeds in Cranbery inlet, and the Elodea patch off the State boat launch. All of this should cost less than \$10,000.
- 2. Conduct a single early summer comprehensive weed survey (Water Environmental) which will cost some \$3,000.
- 3. Conduct Algae treatments as required, along with water sampling and goose control efforts.

We will need to convince the Board of Trustees to allow us to transfer our unused budget each year to the Lakes Reserve account to be accumulated for the year 2001 treatment. Year 1999 and 2000 actions can probably be similar to this year's recommendations, with similar costs.

The year 2001 SONAR treatment will need to be done with a higher sustained concentration than we accomplished in 1996. At that time, we worked toward a sustained concentration of 20 parts per billion for 10 weeks, which we largely achieved. Assuming the SONAR herbicide remains at the same relative strength as at present, the next treatment will need to be at a concentration of 30 parts per billion average over the 10 weeks. Unless the price of SONAR decreases, or a suitable cheaper alternative can be found, the 2001 treatment will then

likely be higher than the \$90,000 we paid in 1996. It will be important that we work with SePro on the use of SONAR as well as investigate other State-Approved herbicides that could do the job for us. A significant challenge, it appears!!

Dear Water Committee Members:

The Water Committee needs to revisit our decision to proceed with the meter setter program inhouse. To summarize first our capital financial position as I presented at the December meeting.

- Budgeted for 1998 \$55,000.00
- Contractor low Bid \$47,601.00
- Capital determined available for 1998 \$35,000.00

With this \$35,000.00 budget our decision was to proceed with an investigation into an in-house program. We asked Ken Douglas to provide a cost estimate for labor and material to accomplish this. I have collected Ken's inputs and other data to project a cost for the setter program.

Program cost for training and equipment use, backfill, tools, including taxes \$2,000.00

For estimating the cost of the program we must select a time frame for work and a quantity of setters to be done. I will assume 60 workdays and 300-meter setters. This would be an average of 5 sites per day. This may be optimistic.

A 60 day program estimated at \$31,811.00, without curb stop valves included would average, for 300 installations, \$106.05 each (tax included). Comparing this cost versus the minimum bid by a contractor for 320 valves at a cost of \$47,601.00 (including tax & bond) would be \$148.75 each.

This information gathered for a cost estimate of the program should reconfirm our decision to proceed in house. I believe we can save money this way, but we must be more involved. Other options are still available if we so choose, but a final decision must be made now.
