Pioneer School District has purchased and networked each classroom with internet capabilities. Our district goal is to infuse technology into the curriculum. We would like to purchase *STAR Math* and *Accelerated Math* programs to implement in our math classrooms.

Math Renaissance (a technology-based math motivation program) is based on two programs, STAR Math and Accelerated Math, which form the foundation for self-paced, individualized math. STAR Math a computer-adaptive math test and database is an achievement level learning information system that provides teachers with accurate math scores in 15 minutes. It serves two primary purposes. First, it provides quick and accurate estimates of students' math skills. Second, it offers estimates of students' math abilities relative to national norms making it easier to fine-tune instruction.

AM is based on four steps that form the foundation for self-paced, individualized math learning:

- 1) Time on Appropriate Practice (TAP) The teacher assigns objectives for each student.
- 2) Learning Information Systems (LIS) *AM* prints a personalized assignment for each student. Students work assignment and scan answers.
- 3) Math Motivation System (MMS) *AM* automatically scores assignment. *AM* immediately prints results and next assignment.
- 4) Motivate, Instruct, Monitor, Intervene (MIMI) The teacher and the student discuss results.

These programs allow teachers to use technology to get immediate, individualized, constructive feedback on each student in the class. The program gives teachers access to a wealth of valuable data. With it, they work individually to help each student achieve their full potential.

First, AM makes the students learn. The program won't let them go on without learning. They can't get by copying homework or any of the other tricks non-learners use to just get by. Next, program prints out the TOPS report, reporting their progress and indicates the problems missed. Students work with the teacher to determine the right answers- and the 'why' of those right answers before going to the next practice.

In January of 2000, Advantage Learning Systems provided our students in grades five through eight server software and four scanners to pilot the AM program. The pilot results showed gains for fifth grade students who used AM for one semester. While many students showed dramatic increases of up to 3.9 grade levels of growth, average Grade Equivalency Growth(GEG) increased by .9. Students pretested at 38.7 and post tested at 46.2, with an average National Competency Equivalences(NCE) gain of 7.5.

Since the success of *Math Renaissance* is well-researched and documented, and because our short pilot project using *AM* software brought enthusiasm from students, teachers, and parents, we want to launch a full-fledged effort using these programs. All math teachers at *Pioneer Intermediate/Middle School* want to be trained in diagnosis and intervention strategies to help spot student problems quickly and to be better able to direct each student toward success.

The ultimate winners are the students themselves, the increased math practice will likely improve their standardized and performance-based test scores (our district WASL test scores could look a lot better). The program includes preparation for the Washington State Essential Learnings. It also builds valuable critical-thinking and real-world problem solving skills that will help students throughout their lives.

At this time, ensuring student access to AM requires funding. We are committed to helping make AM a substantial benefit for our school's children. Our district has committed an in-kind amount to this project of up to \$5000.00. We have received funds and pledges for funding from local business for \$3,100.00 as of this date. Our pilot results indicate strong growth for students of all ability levels. These outcomes provide strong evidence that AM can be successfully used to individualize instruction for all students, ensuring that each child makes significant progress in the classroom. We plan to implement this program as soon as the funding is available.
