Finances

TREASURERS REPORT, Mike Prather

The change to monthly dues billing is progressing. June will be the third month on the new system and we are starting to see the stabilization in our monthly cash flow. Members are reminded that the office can still receive and process payments for those who want to pay three months (or more) at a time in advance.

The special assessment for the golf improvements ended with the April billing. Work continues to insure that all expenses and receipts are correctly posted to the appropriate cost centers (golf, inn restaurant, inn lounge, etc).

WATER COMMITTEE, Don Bird, Chairperson

As the new Chair of the Water Committee I would like to thank Phyl Antonsen for her eight years of service, most of them as Chair of the Committee. Thanks to the efforts of the Water Committee, Steve Wheaton (LLWS), Northwest Water Systems, Joe Castelluccio (Maintenance) and other maintenance staff, we have been able to maintain high water quality at very reasonable rates.

We would also like to thank Brian Parnell for his past service and welcome Pat Paradise to the Committee in his place. At our May meeting the following officers were elected:

Following are some important items to report:

Water system status: Your Lake Limerick Water System is in excellent condition with plenty of high quality water. The Water System has passed all of the required periodic water quality tests. Expect a water quality report to be sent out within a couple months.

Water Hazard Survey: Expect to receive in the mail a water hazard survey in June or July that helps to determine where primary backflow prevention devices are required. This will come from Northwest Water Systems on behalf of Lake Limerick. Please fill out the form and return it promptly. The State requires 100% of these forms to be filled out and returned. If the filled out form is not returned it could result in your water being shut off!

Backflow prevention device testing: Testing of the existing primary backflow prevention devices has been completed for this year. Any device that did not pass the test was repaired by the testing contractor.

Water bill responsibility: Reminder that the home owner is ultimately responsible for paying the water bill regardless of any private agreement about who pays the bill between the home owner and the renter or a property management company.

Water meter shutoff: Remember, if you need to shut off your own water, turn it off at your house or in the water meter box by the street NOT the backflow prevention device. In most cases shutting off the backflow prevention device turns off the water for your house AND your neighbor's house.

Leaks: Once the ground dries out, be on the lookout for leaks either on your property or around your property. Although Steve Wheaton, LLWS staff, has found several leaks recently we still have a substantial amount of unaccounted water usage. If you notice a leak, please notify the LLCC office or the Water office so that it can be checked and fixed.

Water usage: This time of year water usage goes up - more people and more watering in the spring and summer. Try to water garden and lawn during non-peak hours. Unless it is extremely hot, your lawn likely needs water only once a week.

Enjoy your Spring and Summer and remember that water conservation is everybody's responsibility.

Spring and summer are arriving... someday. When they do, there is no better time to clean up the debris from winter, take advantage of the community garage sale to get rid of no longer needed treasures, and otherwise spruce up your property. When all of us bought in Lake Limerick, we all agreed to keep our lots *"free and clear of all weeds and rubbish and do all other things necessary or desirable to keep the premises neat and in good order..."* Do your part to maintain a desirable quality of life in our neighborhoods.

Lately we have had an uptick in complaints about lots and homes not being maintained. This is due in part to comments on social media. The committee is responding to those complaints and appreciates our neighbors for getting involved. It takes the whole community, not just a handful of volunteers to make positive things happen.

Having said that, I hope everyone bears in mind that not all problems are corrected instantly (although we had two very quick successes in the last month.) It can take a few contacts to convince people we are serious. It can take a longer time if we have to travel the path of increasing fines and legal options, such as property liens. Then there is the human side—our neighbors may have been forced to put tarps on roofs that started leaking during this never-ending rainy season. They may be waiting for drier weather to make a repair—that doesn't mean they are scofflaws, nor does it mean the Architectural Committee isn't doing its job. Some residents are on a fixed income, and if a major roof repair is necessary in an older home, they may also be facing the need to increase insulation to meet current building codes—a significant hit to the pocketbook.

On the other hand, there are others in the community who are just flouting the rules, and we try to deal with them seriously, fairly and effectively. The Home Owners Association Board of Directors has supported the Committee's recommendations for dealing with chronic rule-breakers, including revoking "member in good standing" status. Losing "good member" status cuts off access to Lake Limerick facilities and services, including potentially access to water services. These are serious legal and social issues, and they must be addressed with a fair and due process. Thank you to the current members of the Committee for their commitment, compassion and insight.

If you are willing to take on this responsibility for your community, please join the Committee the second Saturday of every month at 9:00 AM at the Inn.

Proposed New USGA Rules of Golf

As part of a joint initiative to modernize the Rules and make them easier to understand and apply, the USGA and The R&A have unveiled a preview of proposed new Rules of Golf.

The release of this preview begins a six-month feedback and evaluation period during which all golfers worldwide can learn about the proposed changes and provide input before they are finalized in 2018 and take effect January 1, 2019.

Current USGA Rule

Rule 27.1, STROKE AND DISTANCE; BALL OUT OF BOUNDS; BALL NOT FOUND WITH FIVE MINUTES

a. Proceeding Under Stroke and Distance

At any time, a player may, **under penalty of one stroke**, play a ball as nearly as possible at the spot from which the original ball was last played (see Rule 20-5), i.e. proceed under penalty of stroke and distance.

Except as otherwise provided in the Rules, if a player makes a stroke at a ball from the spot at which the original ball was last played, he is deemed to have proceeded **under penalty of stroke and distance**.

This is an interesting rule that can help the player! For instance, if a player is on the seventh green three feet above the hole, the hole is cut in the front middle of the green. The player misses the putt and it rolls off the green and down the hill. The player may pick up the ball and place it where he last putted, that is the distance penalty (or lucky break), and must add one stroke to their score.

Another example is, through the green, a player hits a shot into a position that they would be unable to do better from the new location then simply replaying the shot. In this case, the ball must be dropped rather than placed.

Golf Tip of the Month

Swing path determines where the ball starts off. Clubface position determines where the ball will end up. If you swing the club to the left of where the clubface is aimed, the ball will slice from left to right (for a right-handed golfer). If the path is to the right of the clubface direction, the ball will hook (move right to left). Okay, now let's play the fifth hole from the far-left tee! What you need to do is hook the ball. This requires you to aim your clubface at the center of the fairway (15 yards left of the right rough) while aiming your feet about 15 yards to the right of the fairway. If your swing path is where you are aiming your body and your ball is hit with the clubface pointing in the fairway, the ball will start at the right rough (in between the path and clubface aim) and curve to the center of the fairway. It takes some time to trust this, so give it a try in practice rounds or at the driving range. Being able to play different shots makes the game more fun!

Clinics and Lessons

I have not scheduled clinics yet, but should very soon. I am planning on having some beverages (soda, wine or beer), with finger food to go with some short game clinics. I have not set the price of these yet. Also, I will have a couple of free swing clinics to be scheduled for late June or early July.

For private lessons or clinics, just give me a call or come on in to setup an appointment. I will be giving the lessons at Alderbrook golf course driving range. This will allow a better learning experience. My price is \$40 per half hour. This rate is \$80 per hour for a clinic of two to six students for one hour. You can split the cost!

Golf Schedule

We are just coming into our very busy golf season! The golf schedule seems to be continually changing due to conflicts that come up now and then. Please check with the Pro Shop for dates and times of golf events or to make tee times (two weeks in advance for members).

Once we get our new website up, we will keep the golf calendar updated. For our events that you may choose to play in, we have established an event signup book in the Pro Shop. You can check out the theme and the dates of these events in the Pro Shop.

There are only a few Saturdays, between now and the end of September, that we do not have tournaments scheduled. One Saturday each month through September we have a Couple's Night Golf and Dinner tournament with a different format and theme that is open to members and the public. Wednesday evening at 5:00 PM we have scrambles throughout the summer. On Thursdays through July we have the Mason County Golf League at 5:00 PM. The last Friday of each month is the Mixed Scramble and Horserace at 8:30 and 11:00 AM. Keep an eye out for the Lake Limerick Open on July 8th. This is a fund raiser to help fund Jason's projects. These are just a few that I have highlighted.

Jason will be aerifying starting on August 29. We will be on temporary greens for three days or so.

LAKE RESTRICTIONS AND REGULATIONS

Lake rules – read them please

Recently, I mentioned a lake rule to another member who corrected me as the rule I "remembered" wasn't how the rule was written. Time skews our memory and all members of LLCC are responsible for following those rules and responsible for our families and guests following those rules. It's time to refresh your memory as to what those rules are for the safety of those you love and for your neighbors.

If we are all following the same set of rules when we're on the lake then we greatly reduce the chance of an extremely unfortunate accident. We've included the rules page in this newsletter. The following are some of the more critical rules:

- The integrity of the ski lanes must be maintained. Vessels with something or someone in tow have the right of way over all other watercraft (except sailboats). All vessels, including fisherman, must yield the right of way to vessels towing someone and must avoid the ski lanes during skiing hours.
- When a skier or tuber falls, the towing vessel must quickly come off its plane and turn towards the buoy line to retrieve the person that just fell. Do not turn left into the lake under full throttle making a sweeping turn. It is an unpredictable maneuver and blocks the path of any boat that is behind you which needs to pass you on the left.
- Stay a safe and reasonable distance from other skiers, vessels, swimmers, anglers and danger areas. The towrope should be no more than 75 feet long.
- Stunting, such as doing donuts or making swerving "S" maneuvers, increases wake size, is unpredictable and is absolutely not allowed.
- No starting or dropping of skiers or tubers inside the buoy line, this is extremely dangerous.
- Never exceed 6 mph shore side of the buoy line. That includes the starting or dropping of skiers or tubers.

Please re-read the rules and post them for others to read them.

Lake Patrol Boat - out and about

Jack Betterley found it a little lonely driving the patrol boat last summer educating boat operators regarding lake rules. Volunteers to assist were scarce. After a couple of years with limited help, he's handed the patrol boat keys back to our committee. In his place Lou Jackson has come forward and volunteered to man the patrol boat on occasion. If you've been watching dangerous activity on the lake and thinking somebody should do something about that; that somebody is you. You have a copy of the rules, you can stop someone not following those rules and educate them. You can write down or take a picture of their boat's identification numbers and file a report with the office.

The Dredging Project - not quite done yet

Log Toy Park was beat up in the dredging last summer. As part of the plan, at the completion of the actual dredging, it was to be re-levelled, re-gravelled, reseeded and re-opened. We held off on doing it last fall as we realized we had a golden opportunity to dig a trench and put in water and electricity to the covered picnic shelter while it was all torn up anyway. Rain delayed work but the utilities are in. At our recent LLCC Dam Committee Meeting we were discussing when we could have it completely restored for use. We anticipated unhappy muttering members and a lot of civil disobedience as we know one year without using it was bad enough. Already a good number of members are disregarding the park closed sign. So, we'll be racing to get the host site and parking site prepared for use. We'll fence off the area to be reseeded for grass. With a bit of luck and dry weather there's a chance we can officially open the park for use as early as Memorial Day Weekend.

There are a couple of other dredging responsibilities we need to complete. One is removing ivy from a hill by Cranberry Creek and replanting it with native plants. The other is to conduct follow up testing as specified in our Dredging Permit.

Other projects:

We are beginning to make headway on our "to do list" including protecting the Inn Island from erosion while providing safe access to the water, adding ladders to our docks, and installing bollards and drainage at Lake Leprechaun's park.

Weed Control as it relates to the Lakes

You'll see us on the lakes in June to determine where weed treatment will occur. Treatment typically occurs between July and September depending on the areas and weed types being treated. Our contractor will be responsible for making sure proper

notices are posted prior to treatment with aquatic herbicides. Herbicide treatment is regulated under a permit issued by the Washington State Department of Ecology. Advisory signs will identify water use restrictions along waterfronts. Please read any instructions/notices you receive on this issue and comply. If you have any questions or concerns about this, please e-mail Debbie at debram@wzbcpa.com.

You can do your part to help reduce nuisance algae growth, and most importantly the potential for blue-green algae blooms by making sure you aren't letting garden fertilizers get into the lake if you own a lakeside lot, and by maintaining your septic systems.

Budget Process

The Lake Dam Committee develops a current year budget and a 5-year forecast. Our Budget Committee will be meeting on June 17th, 2017 to work on our budgets for the upcoming year. If you have an idea as to how to improve our parks or lakes, we'd like to hear it. Even better if you could provide literature and guestimated costs to go along with it. Register Your Power Boats - boats required to have WA Licenses are required to be registered with Lake Limerick and bear the Lake Limerick Decal.

Number Your Dock - All member docks/floats should be identified with their division and lot numbers. The numbers are to be 3 to 4 inches high, of a CONTRASTING COLOR to the dock/float and permanently attached. The numbers are to be displayed facing the lake (parallel to the shore). The numbers are to be maintained so they are legible at all times.
