TREASURERS REPORT-- Mike Prather

The change to monthly billing continues to provide a steadier flow of funds for our ongoing operations. The large quarterly swings in our cash position at our bank have smoothed out making it easier to plan and pay for our ongoing monthly bills.

Deborah Wallace (with input from all department heads) is working hard on our new budget for next fiscal year (Oct 1, 2017 - Sept 30, 2018). Input been received and is being incorporated into a new yearly budget with estimated expenses listed for each department for each month.

New projects that each department would like to accomplish next year are also being listed, planned and will be reviewed by the Board.

The new budgets (Operating and Special Projects) will give the Board much better tools to look at next year's estimated operating expenses and match those to the expected income from the various departments and the monthly dues.

The Board will review the new budgets in August/September and send them to the members before our annual meeting in mid-October.

COMMUNITY ASSOCIATION MANAGER- Deborah Wallace

Lake Limerick Country Club security is responsible for protecting Club assets, including the parks, green belts, well sites and structures. Lake Limerick residents are responsible for the security of their own property, including vehicles, motor homes and houses. One of the best ways to do this is to know your neighbor. Don't be the person that calls the sheriff to report a burglary in progress next door, only to have the responding officer find out the person accused of "breaking-in" is the homeowner.

If you are interested in participating in a Neighborhood Watch Program, come into the main office and pick up some literature on what you can do to help secure your neighborhood.

Important Security Information

The Mason County Sheriff's Department has had severe cuts to their budget. As a result, they have limited personnel available and need your patience and cooperation as they prioritize incoming calls.

Call The Sheriff If:

- ✓ You have experienced property damage, such as smashed mailboxes.
- ✓ You see an abandoned vehicle on the road, the sheriff will react quickly if it is impeding traffic; if not, it is not high priority.
- ✓ You witness drug activity. Understand they cannot do anything immediately as the information is forwarded to detectives.
- ✓ You experience theft. Theft and drugs usually go hand in hand so it is very important the theft be reported.

Please Do Not Call For Civil Issues!

Lake Limerick residents have been very helpful to the police force by turning in lots of bad people. We can continue to help by urging our County Commissioners to maintain adequate funding for the Sheriff's Department.

WATER COMMITTEE--Don Bird, Chairperson

Water Hazard Survey: Northwest Water Systems (NWS) on behalf of Lake Limerick sent out the Water Hazard Survey in June. As of the beginning of August, only about half the survey forms were filled out and returned or submitted online. The State requires 100% of these forms to be filled out and returned. At additional cost, NWS will have to send out reminders to the rest of the members that failed to turn in the forms in a timely manner. We will have to send out staff to each of the properties that fail to respond after the second attempt to verify that there is no risk to the water system. At that point, if we can't confirm there is no risk to the water system, we would be required by the State to shut off the water to that property.

Water system status: The Lake Limerick Consumer Confidence Report for 2016 was sent out with the Hazard Survey in late June. If you didn't have a chance to read the details, it indicates that all of the water quality tests affecting health passed with excellent results. The only test result that was slightly over the recommended limit was for manganese, which only affects the taste but not health. NWS also submits a Water Use Efficiency report to the State on our behalf summarizing our efforts to be efficient in our use of water. Our total measured consumption went up from 66.1 million gallons in 2015 to 66.8 million gallons in 2016 or about 1% even though we had a number of new homes built in the area. This year our unaccounted usage increased a small amount from 6.6% to 6.9% but it is still well under the State's goal to keep it under 10%. Please help us to reduce the unaccounted water by reporting any leaks you may notice.

Water usage: This summer has been very dry with a record number of days without rain. Although we have plenty of water capacity, we should all conserve water where we can. Only water garden and lawn during non-peak hours and for a short time. Unless it is extremely hot, your lawn likely needs water only once a week.

Water billing: In order to save money, the LLCC office sent out September water bills in a new letter format with the same information as that included in the previous post card format bill. Since the water bills are being sent out with the monthly dues statements, there is no longer a cost advantage to the post card format and it costs more to purchase the preprinted water billing post cards.

Long-range plans: Over the next year, we will be reviewing the long-range plans for the water system with the understanding that the water system is over 50 years old and our demand for water continues to grow. Our long-term goals will be:

- Increase our well capacity
- Plan for the replacement of the main lines
- Upgrade smaller main lines to improve fire flow
- Replace the asbestos/concrete lines
- Monitor aquifer levels to be sure we have a continuing supply of water

Enjoy the last of summer and remember that water conservation is everybody's responsibility.

ARCHITECTURAL COMMITTEE-- Brian Smith, Chairperson

Architectural Committee chairs have often used this space to remind our association members to clean up their yards in the spring after winter storms, trim their yards and keep weeds down in the summer, and make necessary repairs to buildings, fences and roofs before winter. Really? Do our members really need to be reminded of the obvious? Instead, I'd like to talk a bit about community standards and responsibilities, and personal standards and responsibility.

Community standards in Lake Limerick start with the Declarations of Restrictions. These are the basic rules laid down when Lake Limerick was first created more than 50 years ago. The rules were intended to guide the development of a community "all for fun". The basic rules say that yards and properties must be neatly kept up, and weeds kept down, and that activities on a member's property must not cause a nuisance to the neighborhood.

The Board of Directors has adopted rules from time to time to interpret the Declarations and explain what is acceptable. The Board's rules also address issues not specifically covered in the Declarations. These have been adopted over the last 50 years, and include rules about dogs, temporary garages, and overwintering travel trailers. Lastly, our members have the final word on community standards by what they will tolerate, and what they report as violations.

Community responsibility is a different matter. The homeowners association has a legal responsibility to enforce the Declarations of Restrictions fairly and consistently, seeking to maintain community standards. The association needs the support of the entire community to carry out this function. The volunteer Architectural Committee is tasked with judging whether complaints represent violations of community standards, and recommending the best path towards enforcing those standards. A group of community members must make this sort of judgment call—it should not be delegated to one or two people, or to a homeowner's association staff.

Personal standards may be different—some community members prefer a neat yard and a painted house with a roof in good repair. Others seem to prefer blue tarps on various parts of their houses, and derelict cars, trucks, RVs and garbage scattered on their property, punctuated with piles of junk, maybe covered with blue tarps...and letting their dogs run free, loud parties and making and dealing drugs.

Personal responsibility means association members respect community standards in how they develop and maintain their property. Personal responsibility extends to not expecting "someone else" to deal with problems and complaining when problems aren't resolved quickly or thoroughly enough to satisfy expectations. Responsible members of the Lake Limerick Community are willing to report violations (we all know the TSA saying, "If you see something say something") and they should be willing to volunteer to serve on Committees devoted to improving Lake Limerick's quality of life. The Architectural Committee currently has 7 volunteer members from Divisions 1, 2, and 3; one member from Division 5; and no members from Division 4. The committee needs the support of members from all parts of the community.

Some people have said that social media sites like Facebook, Twitter and blog sites have increased social responsibility because everyone can become involved. Certainly, many people complain about conditions in Lake Limerick neighborhoods on media sites like the new Nextdoor site. Other folks on these sites use them constructively for the good of the neighborhood. The reality is that after all the tweeting, Facebooking, and blogging are said and done, we still need flesh and blood volunteers to make things work in Lake Limerick. The sad fact is that our volunteers are aging and with a few notable exceptions, there doesn't seem to be a new generation of residents ready and willing to step up.

I am reminded of the contributions of the chicken and the pig to the great eggs and bacon breakfasts served at the pro-shop café. The chicken is involved, but the pig is committed. Sore fingers from twittering are not community and personal commitment... joining committees and attending meetings to make your views and concerns known are. I hope that some of you are willing to move beyond the Twitterverse to the real world and make a meaningful contribution to the community—if not you, who?

GREENS COMMITTEE- Vern Duggan, Chairperson

Hello from the Greens Committee.

We have been busy. The sun has come out and this has increased play on the golf course. In the Pro Shop, Ron Stull and his staff have been working hard with many tournaments and league play. This has brought in more revenue for the community.

The Café has been under new management since 7/1/17 with Brandon Lawin. He is the Chef at the Inn. With buying for both the Inn and the Café, he has been able to bring down costs. This brought about lower prices at the Café' and while still generating a good return on our money. With his training of personnel and his attention to detail, he has been delivering good food and happy customers.

Jason Howerton and his Maintenance crew have been doing a great job.

I am often asked, "How are you looking out for our money?" The committee is committed to get the best value for the best cost. September Meeting – cancelled

The Lake Limerick End of Summer Bash is scheduled the same day as the regular Lake Dam Committee meeting. The following weekend posed a problem as well over half of the committee would have been unable to attend. So, we opted not to meet in September.

Park Maintenance and Improvements Projects

This September a sprinkler system and sod will be installed at Log Toy Park. Within the next few months, we'll be replacing and adding additional dock cleats to many of our docks, especially Anglia and Banbury. For

Banbury Park, the Inn Island and Lake Leprechauns park projects we're either waiting for project plans, permits, or availability of resources. Much of the waiting is for things outside of our control. We continue to promote, suggest, and budget for current projects while forecasting and planning for future projects. If you have ideas or suggestions, please come to our meetings and share! Some of the best ideas start with a member coming to a meeting.

Lakes Weed Treatment

The lakes will be treated this summer – a little later than usual. We will meet with our lake expert later in September to evaluate this summer's efforts and plan next year's treatment later this fall.

A great number of lakes in the Pacific Northwest are dealing with large, unsightly and potentially dangerous algae blooms and explosive weed populations. We are not one of those lakes because we have invested in maintaining the health of our Lakes. We monitor water quality and temperature and have an expert Limnologist survey our lakes looking for noxious weeds and potential problems so we can proactively protect our lakes. There have been two algae blooms reported. Both dissipated before they were a problem.

The primary pollutant to our lakes is our aging septic systems. If you haven't pumped your tank in the last 3 - 5 years, or it is failing – you're adding nutrients to the lakes that feed the algae and weeds, even those properties that do not have a view of the lake. Please make sure that your septic system is working correctly. Do your best to encourage geese to find another lake to swim on. A goose produces the same amount of poop as if four men pooped off the side of their boat every day. That poop is feeding the plants. If you see a weed in the lake pull it out by the roots– and haul it all the way up to the street (immediately.) If that is done systematically over 5 years the weeds in that location would be all but gone. Without the weeds, the algae will have nothing to hold on to thereby moving downstream. If you want some great ideas as to how to accomplish removing a bunch of weeds from your lakebed with the least amount of effort, talk to your neighbors, especially those who've been around for a while or come to one of our meetings. You can also check out a weed cutter from the Pro-Shop.

Annual Lowering of the Lakes

As in past years, and in anticipation of fall rains, the weir boards may start being removed from the spillways at Lake Limerick in mid- September and from Lake Leprechaun October 1st. This means the lakes will be lowered to winter levels by the end of October. Plan accordingly if you need to remove your boat from the lake. They will be put back in place slowly beginning on April 1, 2018, to begin again the process of "raising the lakes" for summer use.

Styrofoam Supporting Docks

Washington State and Lake Limerick Country Club prohibit the use of Styrofoam or a similar product, whether wrapped or unwrapped, to support your dock. Some of you have received letters requiring you to replace them with compliant floats. A couple of years ago the Dock Rules were updated to allow you to keep the size and shape of your current dock (you must follow a set of conditions.) Please be aware that the committee is going to start looking into ways of "encouraging you" to get those floats replaced. For some docks, you need more than new floats – your docks are becoming derelicts and safety hazards. The Dock Rules require you to keep your dock in good condition. Some of you have docks that need significant

help – please repair or replace immediately. If you have any questions, please contact the Lake Dam Committee or come to one of our fascinating meetings.

Lake Patrol – Might Return For Next Year

Lou Jackson has stepped in to fill the void of a Lake Patrol by staffing the Patrol Boat periodically. Moreover, it looks like he's interested in stepping up efforts and rounding up more volunteers for next year – thank you Lou for all you DO! You'd think that as a community-owned lake we wouldn't need to mention it, but there are those of you who persistently forget life vests (a WA legal requirement for skiers, tubers and anyone under 13 years old,) speed limits, boat lanes, buoy safety rules, quiet times, boat registration rules and other basic boat safety rules. Please do your part for the safety of your own families and others by learning, then following the rules. You can be a big help to Lake Limerick, to the Lake Patrol, and to the safety of others when you practice safe and legal boating on Lake Limerick.

Anglers

I hope you caught the big one sometime this summer. Sadly, we're not a year around fishing lake – so please be aware that October 31st is the last day of 2017 you can fish in our lakes. The next fishing season starts the last Saturday of April 2018.

I close this article by hoping the rest of your summer is all that you hope it is. I invite you to come to the next Lake Dam Committee Meeting, first Saturday of October 2017 in the lounge at 9:30 a.m.

PRO SHOP NEWS, Ron Stull, PGA Head Golf Professional

Golf Tip of the Month

This time of year, you are busy playing in tournaments and leagues. If you are having trouble with your game, it may help to take a lesson to straighten out your immediate problems. For those of you that are learning to play, this is great weather for getting out and doing a series of lessons. We can also do some group lessons. For the group lessons, I prefer to have students that are similar in their golf skills. Next season, I will post signup sheets for some group lessons and pair you up. If you want to get your own group together, so much the better.

For now, I recommend that you stick to the basic fundamentals; grip, stance, posture, ball position and swinging “on plane”. If you want me to do a quick look, check in with me at the Pro Shop. I will be happy to take a five-minute look to help you determine what you should work on.

Club fitting is very important to help you with your golf fundamentals. People that say it’s the “golfer not the club” may be correct and may not! I do not have the club fitting systems or the space to house them. I can only help so much without the equipment to try. Places that do are Puetz, Pro Discount Golf, Golfsmith in Portland and Gold Mountain near Bremerton. They will be able to get you the right set of clubs. You can buy straight from them, online or from our Pro Shop. We all discount about the same amount. We can match any price that is not below our cost (closeouts).

Etiquette and Golf Course Policies Manual

We now have an approved *Golf Course Policies Manual* effective July 15, 2017. This manual has a wide range of policies and rules for the golf course. We will soon have copies on our website. Copies may also be obtained in the Pro Shop.

Etiquette is about common sense on how to treat the golf course and fellow players. It is not a rule that pull carts should be taken outside of 30 feet from the greens and not between the bunkers and greens, but it is a nice thing to do. Those that wish to play “Summer Rules” can be impacted by their ball coming to rest in a pull cart track.

Those players using riding carts should always follow the 90-degree rule and all golf course signage when carts are allowed on the course. This helps keep the turf grass in the areas near the greens in better condition with less soil compaction.

Pull carts and golf carts should never be taken on the tees. The less traffic on the tees reduces the compaction of the sand and soil creating healthier turf grass.

Bunkers (sometimes called “sand traps”) should always be raked smooth. The rakes should be placed at 90 degrees from the back edge of the bunker. This creates the least impact on the player’s balls entering into the bunker behind your group.

Rules of Golf

The Rules of Golf create a fair and equal playing field for all golfers. When players do not play by the rules the opposite is obviously true.

Rule 1-3, Agreement to Waive Rules

Players must not agree to exclude the operation of any **Rule** or to waive any penalty incurred.

Penalty for Breach of Rule 1-3:

Match play - Disqualification of both sides

Stroke play – Disqualification of competitors concerned.

Not all of us know all the rules so we may not be sure whether we are violating a rule of golf. I would like us to help each other learn the rules. We have had occasions recently, where players had different ideas on what a rule is for a specific problem. Please check with me and I will be glad to get the right answer to you. During competition, if you have to play two balls under Rule 3-3 Doubt as to Procedure. Then you can get the correct ruling when you finish. You can usually text me for an answer if you are on the golf course. If I am at a meeting, I may not be able to respond immediately, but will as soon as I am free.

FOOD AND BEVERAGE-- Brandon Lawin, Head Chef/Food and Beverage Manager

Things are going very well for the food and beverage dept. We have been getting more and more business as the weeks go by.
