Reduce size of fine to closer to mid-range in fine schedule-\$1200; reduce fine to \$1000.	Change made in proposed resolution
Reduce potential MNIGS penalty to 1 year; or 18 months for illegal fireworks discharge	Change made in proposed resolution
Higher fines for illegal fireworks use	This would become moot in 2027 with the resolution as proposed. More sentiment expressed to lower fines from original proposal.

Neighbors enforcing against neighbors could lead to violence;	Board will consider options including use of third parties to avoid neighbor-on-neighbor confrontations
Documenting violations needs to have a methodology, some standard for violation documentation needed	Good suggestion—will be considered as Board action
Enforcement will be a problem	Board will consider options including use of third parties to avoid neighbor-on-neighbor confrontations
Hard to distinguish between illegal and legal fireworks	Good comment. This would be an issue only in 2026 as the resolution is currently proposed. Board will consider this as part of enforcement plan.
PROCESS	
Actually, this could be two resolutions, one now addressing illegal fireworks, and one voted on by membership banning all fireworks	Open for debate by the Board at the hearing for the possible adoption of the proposed or an amended resolution
Tie violations to the county burn-bans,	Lacks the certainty and public knowledge of a full time ban not dependent on county action and advertisement of same; a permanent resolution prevents purchase of fireworks by members anticipating no burn ban; hard to contract for security for enforcement when burn bans are issued irregularly.
Allow New Years fireworks	New Years fireworks still pose a nuisance even in wet weather, and an example for new owners who may

		think fireworks are allowed at other times of the year, increasing enforcement efforts during periods of high fire danger.
	Focus on fire prevention and not on nuisance	Main focus is on fire prevention, as noted in the findings particularly in light of recent state drought declarations over past decade and impacts of climate change.
	Vets/Pets—the negative impact of explosive fireworks on people and pets whose emotions are triggered by loud noises is important	The Vets/Pets issue is real, has been mentioned in Facebook comments on this proposed ban, and applies to proposals to allow fireworks in wet season e.g. New Year’s Eve and the next Seahawks Superbowl win.
	Just enforce current county/state rules	Current state rules are not being followed. County rules are neither enacted nor enforced consistently. Annual uncertainty over the County Commissioners reactions to weather conditions, and their willingness or lack thereof to act. LLCC does not, and is not suggesting it should enforce county regulations—this resolution finds discharging fireworks as a violation of the Declarations binding on all homeowners and guests in the LLCC community and is proposing to enforce the HOA rules as provided in its governing documents. This resolution does recognize that violations of state law which can threaten or impact quality of life in the community can be considered a violation of the noxious and nuisance provisions of the Declarations.
	Lake Cushman has banned fireworks, so has City of Shelton	This resolution takes impetus from those bans.
	Learn from Hoodspout area experience with wildland fires, recent events in Paradise and Palisades fires in California—don’t want similar events to happen here	This resolution is proposed in part to recognizing the severe impact on the LLCC community which could result from a fireworks caused wildfire/forest fire, and also recognizes

		the closer to home fire on McKewan Prairie Road several years ago during which thankfully the wind was blowing away from LLCC, and aerial tankers were available and not fighting other fires.
	How get the word out, particularly top those who always use illegal fireworks.	Adoption of this resolution 2 months ahead of the 2026 July 4 th holiday, and 8 months before 2027 should allow time for a public education campaign using email blasts, 3 social media sites dedicated to highlighting legitimate LLCC issues, posting on the LLCC HOA website, and notices in the monthly bills.
